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


# Mission Statements of diverse public and private interests in project



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# Project Accomplishments and Planned Implementation

- 2015: 317 Acres completed on USFS Lands
  2016: 344 Acres Treated on BLM and State of
  - Wyoming Lands
- 2017: 545 Acres USFS
- 2018: 200 Acres BLM and 50 Acres State of Wyoming. Planning for 285 acres on USFS.
- 2019:Expansion of project onto Rock Springs BLM jurisdiction. 500 acres USFS.
- 2020: Planning for 200 acres BLM

### Issues Related to Coordinated Aspen Restoration effort

- Local residents disapproval of cutting of conifers within area. Local representatives interest and heated response after the cutting.
- Outreach challenges
- Fire is not a frequent element of landscape
- How treatments looked afterwards. Piling and lop and scatter. Public reaction
- Satisfying funding partners expectations

### Issues Related to Coordinated Aspen Restoration effort

- Differing prescriptions between BLM, USFS and Wyoming State Lands. Challenges of communicating to contractors these differences.
- NEPA timing between USFS and BLM.
- Managing browsing pressure after treatments without individual fencing efforts
- Expense: \$812 dollars an acre average: \$590 /acre lop and scatter, \$1600/acre cut and pile Total cost through 2017 of \$975,000

### **Future Planning from Lessons Learned**

 Public outreach and education ahead of implementation to minimize negative public perception.

Clearer specs for treatments that are consistent across project area

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Planning prior to treatment to minimize browsing pressure on young aspen

Better pre-plan reconnaissance or survey prior to project initiation

Project expected to continue for next 10 years

•Expansion to west within South Pass Area-Southern Wind River Mountains onto High Desert BLM

 Potential for mixed mountain shrub treatments, including broadcast burning
